LEARNING PROGRAMME

COURSES & WORKSHOPS PROGRAMME

Due to the limitations of space in this Programme Guide – we recommend you check the website for more detailed information on each course and Tutor Bio's or visit the Information Room.

SPECIALIST COURSES (4 PARTS)

Our Specialist Courses form the backbone of the learning programme. There are FOUR to choose from. Specialist courses are made up of four 60-minute sessions. Sessions 1 & 2 on Sunday and Sessions 3 & 4 on Monday. Choices this year are:

A NOVEL IN FOUR SESSIONS

MCH

Course Tutor: Anne Hamilton

'The Skeleton Story' technique helps the author create an outline comprising setting, character(s) and quest. This is the forerunner of a synopsis and a framework to build upon.

'Writing The End' (or a draft of it) at an early stage is a psychological boost. It offers the author a clear endpoint to work towards. Participants will write a good ending - and consider the importance of that good ending being also a beginning.

'Pre-Empting Saggy Centres' interrogates plot. The author will develop 4-6 key scenes that hold the story and in doing so ensure that character (development) is integral.

'Beginning A Beginning' deliberately comes last. Understanding the difference between The Beginning and A Beginning is essential, especially if the author is a perfector or a procrastinator. It will allow a participant to progress to becoming a 'finisher'.

Participants will be encouraged to use their own material throughout, so that at the end of the four sessions they will have a clear body of work and a plan for going forward. Each session will be workshop-based with the opportunity to write and to share that writing within the group. 'Homework' will be set following each session. This is not obligatory but will enhance the course experience by allowing participants to seek feedback on their writing.

WRITING SHORT STORIES THAT MAKE MONEY BLY1

Course Tutor: Della Galton

This is a course of practical tips and hints to help you write your best stories and increase your chances of success. It's an interactive course, workshop based. Be prepared to have fun.

Suitable for beginners or more experienced writers. Covering the following:

- 1. Where can I sell a short story these days?
- 2. Markets for fiction.
- 3. Good short story competitions, and how to improve your chances.
- 4. What's the X Factor and how can I get it?

THE CRAFTY ART OF CREATIVE NON-FICTION BLY2 Course Tutor: Simon Whaley

The Crafty Art of Creative Non-Fiction will explore how to bring true stories to life to make them more engaging, fun, and interesting to readers.

Whether you write memoir, travel, nature and landscape, food, true crime, or other non-fiction genres, drawing upon creative non-fiction techniques can make your writing zing!

This four-part course is suitable for those who are new to creative non-fiction, as well as those who want to explore the genre further.

There will be writing opportunities in each workshop to put into practice the lessons learned.

We'll explore what creative non-fiction is and isn't, and focus on four key creative non-fiction writing blocks that will bring drama to your work.

Creative non-fiction is about true stories, told well.

LEARNING FROM THE LAUREATES (POETRY)

TR

Course Tutor: Alison Chisholm

This course will offer fresh ideas and techniques to new and experienced poets, linking them to the work of poets laureate from John Dryden to Simon Armitage.

This course is intended for anyone who enjoys poetry, regardless of their level of experience. Each session stands alone, so people who wish to attend just one or two sessions will benefit from them.

Everyone who attends will find their poetry skills enhanced by the points of technique being addressed, information about beginning and developing new poems, and consideration of putting a fresh spin onto their work, and a final polish.

Tuition includes talks, discussions, text study, group work and individual exercises. The course will end with a final Q&A opportunity.

There are 12 Short Courses to choose from during the week. Short Courses are two hours long in total – each session is an hour with a morning or afternoon break in between them.

WHEN LIFE HAPPENS – WRITE IT!

MCH

Course Tutor: Sharon Cook

Life happens ... As writers we often try to make sense of the why, the what ifs and the how comes. But what if we could write it down, shape it into prose, even a book, help other people by sharing our own experiences?

There are some incredible memoirs out there, and many of them are not written by celebrities, but by ordinary people like you and me.

During this two-part course you will have the opportunity to explore the possibilities of your own memoir, learn some simple approaches to coax out your own story and gain inspiration from others as we share approaches to life writing.

This two-part course will include crafting a short piece of memoir to share, along with discussion about mainstream memoirs and moral dilemmas, how memory plays a part in shaping what we write. At the very least, by drilling down into our own experiences, we can help deepen character development in our fiction.

Your story has value. Are you brave enough to share it with others?

WRITING ROMANCE

Course Tutor: Jennifer Page

In this intensive two-hour workshop, we'll explore how to write romance that stands out in today's crowded market. We'll focus on creating genuine characters and emotional connections that resonate with readers. We'll explore different tropes, and discuss how to use them in fresh, original ways. Through practical exercises and discussion, we'll discover how to create realistic obstacles that keep our couples apart whilst keeping our stories grounded in truth.

We'll learn to write sizzling chemistry that leaps off the page, craft meetcutes that hook readers from the first scene, and develop character arcs that lead to deeply satisfying emotional payoffs. We'll explore how to balance internal and external conflicts, write dialogue that crackles with tension, and create those vital moments that tug at readers' heartstrings.

By the end of this workshop, we'll have the tools to craft romance that feels both inventive and true-to-life, with characters readers can't help falling in love with and stories that linger in their hearts.

Suitable for both aspiring and intermediate writers looking to take their romance writing to the next level.

POETRY COMPETITIONS

BLY2

Course Tutors: Emma Purshouse & Steve Pottinger

How should you approach poetry competitions? What goes on behind the scenes? Why do we have to pay fees to enter? What does a judge actually do? These competitions, they make a fortune, don't they!? A workshop designed to answer some of your questions about the business of poetry competitions. We'll also be honing our work to give it

the best chance in a competition, considering some of the competitions currently open for entries, and having a go at a simulated judging activity with a view to considering how that experience might help us to see the potential for success in our own work.

First hour: a discussion about the nature of poetry competitions; considering rules and regulations; practical judging activity.

Second hour: a chance to prepare poems for entry into current competitions.

HOW TO WRITE FOR SCREEN

TR

Course Tutor: Izzy Searle

Love TV and films but don't know how to write them? This course by award-winning writer Izzy Searle will teach you all the screenwriting basics - from learning the strict scriptwriting format, to brainstorming what ideas make a hit short film, to finding out how a crew onset uses a script to create a film.

This short course will begin with an introduction to screenwriting, guiding you through slug lines, action lines, and dialogue. Izzy will workshop how to write natural dialogue that follows realistic imperfect idiolects. She will also discuss suggested structures and how exciting locations can bring a fresh energy to a scene. Next, the class will bounce around ideas for a 2-3 hander short film.

Participants will brainstorm characters and plots for their script. Everyone will leave with an idea they could develop further at home. Next, Izzy will discuss how scripts are broken down and used on set. A screenplay is a recipe and the director is the chef. Filmmaking is collaborative, everchanging, creative yet technical.

This short course will give you an insight into the filmmaking process from script to screen. Finally, Izzy will share some screenwriting opportunities: recommended competitions, upcoming submissions, and links to curated writing opportunity lists.

AUTHENTIC CRIME FICTION

Course Tutor: Dr Russell Wate

Russell will outline the fundamentals of a murder investigation and get the course delegates to participate in working through various investigation strategies, thinking about writing about a victim, offenders, interviews, court cases etc. This will allow delegates to walk in a homicide detective's shoes.

To support the learning, it will include a section on the high-profile cases Russell has been involved in and the investigation into the murders of Holly Wells and Jessica Chapman by Ian Huntley, which he played a lead role in.

The second part will talk through Russell's methodology for writing his crime fiction books and discuss the different crime investigations involved in the books that he has had published in the DCI Alexander McFarlane series (four books in the series).

Discussions through this section will also include any books delegates are working on and hopefully suggestions on how to write an authentic crime mystery will be discussed.

Clever ways to win over audiences and tips on how to read without stumbling, memorising your words and even handling unexpected events and hecklers.

WRITER BEWARE!

We all love writing, but writing with a purpose or goal can sometimes be difficult. Thankfully, there is help available - through a plethora of devices, software programmes or services. But which of these can be trusted? You may think you can spot a scam at a hundred paces, but some organisations have developed clever ways to separate you from your money!

Gerald Hornsby and Anita Belli, with decades of writing and publishing experience between them, will chart a course through this maze, highlighting the good and the not-so-good, and hopefully help you to protect yourselves from unscrupulous ne'er-do-wells!

We will discuss and explain some of the ways in which companies, and sometimes other writers, try to separate you from your money. What computer software / hardware do you need? Is an editor necessary? What's the point of an agent? How much does it cost to be an author in 2025? How much should I invest in my writing?

And then we'll move onto the thorny issue of publication. So many of us want a traditional publishing deal, but is it the best option for all of us? Is the publishing decision a simple trad / self-pub choice, but should we think of other, perhaps hybrid, options?

We will discuss openly and honestly the potential costs of getting a book published, and are they good value?

EROTIC SHORT STORIES

Are you looking to try your hand (or should that be pen?) at something different? Perhaps even risqué? Maybe you've written erotic short stories before but haven't been successful at getting any published. Whatever your circumstances, if you're looking to make your erotic short stories stand out (in a good way) then this short course is for you.

The sessions will be led by long-time writer and editor, Lucy Felthouse. With well in excess of one hundred erotic short stories published, and countless others edited, Lucy has plenty of experience in this field. Pick

up hints and tips, hear some examples, take part in some fun exercises to get your creative juices flowing, and have the opportunity to ask questions.

The first session will consist of an introduction, some hints and tips, an example and some time for working on your own piece. The second session will provide the opportunity for another exercise, group discussion and a Q&A section.

*Note: Expect bad language and sexual references. This course will be a safe space, nothing will be shared outside of it, and delegates will not be expected to read out their work unless they want to.

MAGIC IN THE ARCHIVES

Magic in the Archives is a short course that will inspire you to explore the endless possibilities that lie waiting in local archives, museums, and online repositories like The National Archives. This course is for fiction and non-fiction writers, across all genres.

When we think about archives, we often think of dusty basements and dusty books. Some may see these as places for academics and genealogists only. This could not be further from the truth. Archives are treasure troves of primary sources (documents and objects) and untapped creative writing potential.

Erica will share her own discoveries of wild and wonderful stories she has accidentally discovered in her years as an academic historian. She will show you how to make the most of these incredible resources and how to approach the people behind the desks, the gatekeepers, otherwise known as Archivists. She will show you how to start and which source materials will provide the most inspiration.

You can create a backstory for a defendant in a 17th century trial or write from the perspective of a widow whose husband left their eldest son a failing farm and a nice set of silver spoons. A collection of wartime photos can inspire a short story... when she says the possibilities and inspiration are endless, she means it!

THROUGH THE SENSORY GATES

Discover the untapped potential of your senses to elevate your storytelling. In these transformative sessions, you'll be guided on a journey beyond sight and mind to the rich sensory landscape that shapes your narratives. Learn to deeply listen to the stories woven into the world around you and awaken a vibrant, creative connection to your work.

Part 1: For many, vision dominates—but storytelling thrives when all senses are engaged. Together, we'll embark on a playful, deliberate exploration of touch, sound, smell, and taste to uncover hidden channels where fresh stories are waiting to emerge.

Part 2: Transform your sensory discoveries into vibrant words. Whether creating new pieces or re-imagining existing work, you'll share and workshop your narrative developments with a supportive group.

The sessions will be novel for many, fun for most and engaging for all. Leave feeling reinvigorated and ready to channel new energy into your projects.

EDITING YOUR FICTION

Course Tutor: Morgen Bailey

A fun way to learn some of the most common 'mistakes' writers make and 'make your writing shine'.

Over the course of editing 300+ manuscripts, Morgen Bailey quickly learned that many writers, especially early in their career, make similar 'mistakes'. With the simple tools Morgen provides, you can make your writing shine.

This short course will focus on points of view, tenses and characters – clarification and improvement exercises and discussions, grabbing your reader (beginnings and pacing) –

How to write a gripping opening; making readers turn the page and writing techniques – showing not telling (discussion and highlighter pen exercise!) for creating dazzling description and dynamic dialogue.

We'll also look at quick editing techniques; from a purpose-written piece and discover what is vital to maintain the integrity of the story and what can be discarded.

WRITE THE RAINBOW

Emma Purshouse is a writer, performance poet, experienced workshop facilitator and poetry competition judge. She performs at spoken word nights and festivals across the UK, often using her native Black Country dialect. She was the first Poet Laureate for the City of Wolverhampton.

Her children's poetry collection 'I Once Knew a Poem Who Wore a Hat' (Fair Acre Press) won the poetry section of the Rubery Book award in 2016. Her poetry publication 'Close' (Offa's Press) was shortlisted for the same award in 2018. Her debut novel 'Dogged' is published by Ignite Books.

She is one third of the poetry collective 'Poets, Prattlers, and Pandemonialists' who run slams, poetry nights, workshops, and poetry projects across the English Midlands.

Emma's poem 'Catherine Eddowes Tin Box as a Key Witness' came 3rd in the National Poetry Competition in 2021. Her latest collection is called 'It's Honorary, Bab' (Offa's Press 2022).

Emma is currently editor of The Blackcountryman magazine.

ABOUT STEVE

Steve Pottinger is a writer, poet, and workshop facilitator, as well as being a founding member of Wolverhampton arts collective Poets, Prattlers, and Pandemonialists, who run poetry competitions on behalf of literary festivals in the North and Midlands.

He has performed the length and breadth of the country – including appearances at StAnza, WOMAD, Ledbury, and Morecambe Poetry Festival – and his work regularly appears online in CultureMatters, Yorkshire Bylines, and the Morning Star.

HOW TO CATCH A MURDERER

This talk covers a little bit about Russell's career, firstly as a uniform officer and then as a detective. In particular as a homicide detective, covering techniques used including the Soham murders and the deaths of Holly and Jessica.

The talk concludes with how his fiction books incorporate the techniques of a real homicide detective in his fictional detective DCI McFarlane

ABOUT RUSSELL

Russell is a very experienced, now retired senior homicide detective. He worked as the senior investigating officer in over 100 major crime cases, not only murders but also international kidnapping cases and large-scale paedophile enquiries. He has received 14 commendations from judges and chief police officers for some of these cases.

He is best known both nationally and Internationally for his work on safeguarding but also in relation to the investigation into the deaths of Holly Wells and Jessica Chapman - the two ten-year-old girls who were murdered by Ian Huntley in 2002.

He is also well-known both in the UK and abroad for his work relating to the investigation of child deaths and safeguarding children. He completed a doctorate where his thesis was on, 'The Investigation of Child Death: a balanced approach between sensitivity and the investigative mindset'. It has been published and read widely. He carries out safeguarding reviews on high profile cases around the country.

Russell is also the author of four crime novels 'The DCI Alexander McFarlane crime series' where his investigative knowledge, and his love of travel comes to the fore. He is frequently being asked to and carries out after dinner talks and training sessions on his investigative career and also how to write an authentic crime novel.
